



"JUVENILE RECIDIVISM: WHAT JUDGES AND MASTERS NEED TO KNOW ABOUT YOUTHFUL RE-OFFENDING IN PENNSYLVANIA"

(Judges and Juvenile Court Masters Only)

Since 2011, the Juvenile Court Judges' Commission has collected, analyzed, and reported on the recidivism outcomes of youth who had been under the jurisdiction of juvenile courts in Pennsylvania in an attempt to learn more about what types of juvenile offenders are most likely to return to crime and to determine the impact of the Juvenile Justice System Enhancement Strategy (JJSES). This training will provide an overview of the major findings of this comprehensive work, particularly in the context of what judges need to know about youthful re-offending. In addition, information will be provided on how the population of juveniles entering the Pennsylvania juvenile justice system has changed, and what impact this has on statewide recidivism rates.

Join with colleagues from within your juvenile justice system area of specialty to discuss issues of mutual concern and interest. Individual caucuses will be held for chief juvenile probation officers. juvenile probation supervisors, line probation officers, residential service providers and victim service providers. These facilitated caucuses will be highly interactive and offer participants the opportunity to discuss critical issues and needs for the future.

Mr. Webb currently serves as the Director of Student Support Services at Penn State University-Berks and is working to obtain his Ph.D. in Higher Education Administration

In addition to being a higher education administrator, mentor, coach and advisor, Webb designed an autobiographical program titled "Walking on Both Sides of the Street...the Road to Success". The program focuses on encouraging students to understand the importance of success, and challenges them to see and take advantage of every opportunity because a second chance is not always available. This program emphasizes topics such as conflict resolution, leadership, diversity, education, communication, values, integrity and ethics, which he presents at various student venues.

"BALANCED & RESTORATIVE JUSTICE: THE STORY BEHIND THE Redefinition of Pennsylvania's Juvenile Justice Mission"			



In January of 1995, newly elected Governor Tom Ridge called the General Assembly into Special Session to focus exclusively on the issue of crime. Special Session No. 1 of 1995 would see the passage of 37 separate bills, 15 of which affected the juvenile justice system in some fashion. Together, these laws collectively represent the most dramatic changes in the history of Pennsylvania's iuvenile justice system. The most significant of the new laws was Act 33, which included the redefinition of the very mission of our juvenile justice system to require "...balanced attention to the protection of the community, the imposition of accountability for offenses committed and the development of competencies to enable children to

become responsible and productive members of the community." Now, 20 years later. Balanced and Restorative Justice remains the core mission and purpose of our juvenile justice system. This panel discussion session, moderated by Keith Snyder, Executive Director of the Juvenile Court Judges' Commission, includes many of the key actors involved both directly and indirectly with crafting this historic shift to what is now widely known as a national model of juvenile justice.
